B2 Animal Testing

Human sin disfigures the whole creation, as it groans with eager longing for God's redemption.

(cf Romans 8:22,23)

The weight of suffering amongst God's creatures

bears heavily upon us,

but it is a load we need not bear alone.

Lord of life and of death,

of the present and of the future.

we bring before you our anguish in the face of suffering,

our despair in the face of cruelty,

and our helplessness in the face of death.

Strengthen us to bear this burden,

and in your power, renew us.

We bring before you, Lord, the thousands of animals, dying in our laboratories every year -

those that suffer simply to satisfy our vanity, curiosity and greed;

those that are compelled to endure experiments of no relevance to their welfare;

those bred for organ transplants;

those bred for organ transplants,
those facing pain and torment from diseases
deliberately introduced into their bodies;
those that never taste the freedom of the outside world
from the moment they are born to the time they die.
Strengthen us to lighten their burden,

and in your power, renew us.

God of the desolate and despairing, your Son Jesus Christ was forced to carry the instrument of his own death - the cross that became for us the source of life and healing.

Transform us in our grief and despair that in the pain we bear you might be for us, and for the animals we pray for, a fount of life and a spring of hope; through him who died for us, yet is alive and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. **Amen.**

B3 The Servant-King

Christ the King has come to dispel the darkness of our hearts.

Have mercy on us; deliver us from judgement; bind up our wounds and revive us; in Jesus Christ our Lord.

May the God of love bring you back to himself, forgive you your sins, and assure you of his eternal love in Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

B4 General

- the maltreatment of pets and other animals,

bought and sold to satisfy our vanity and

needless pleasure;

- the decimation of wild life brought about by pollution,

hunting, poaching, and the destruction of habitat;

Forgive the arrogance of our race,

which regards animals as existing simply to serve

human ends,

and which transforms your divine dominion

into a diabolical tyranny.

We are heartily sorry and repent of our sin.

Cleanse us and heal us.

that by the power of your Spirit,

we may be remade in the image of your Son, Jesus,

the Servant-King,

and raised to a new life in him.

the second Adam, the first-fruits of your

redeemed Creation.

Holy God,

holy and strong,

holy and immortal,

have mercy upon us.

O God, our beginning and our end,

Bless, we pray, the countless organisations

and individuals,

who are working to relieve the suffering of animals

and to promote their welfare.

We remember especially the Anglican Society

for the Welfare of Animals, its members and officers.

Help us all to play our part

in freeing Creation from its bondage

and in bringing it into the glorious liberty of the children

of God.

We ask this for the sake of Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

B5 General

As part of an act of penitential remembrance, the name of each species of animal being prayed for is read out. The number that have died over the past year might also be mentioned. A bell is tolled and a short period of silence kept.

Let us pray that we may know light and hope in Jesus Christ:

through our love for Nature,

through our care for animals,

through our respect for every living creature:

Father, hallowed be your name.

On our farms and in our homes.

in our colleges and schools,

wherever we deal with other living creatures,

and wherever animal welfare is planned,

Father, your kingdom come.

By the exercise of humble dominion,

by sharing in your rule of love,

by following Jesus, the servant-king,

Father, your will be done.

Through openness to your life-giving Word and your way of Peace give us today our daily bread.

We have broken your commandments, and pursued our own selfish pleasures and ambitions at the cost of our fellow creatures, forgive us our sins.

Where we have been mocked, maligned or injured in the work we have sought to do for animals: we forgive those who sin against us.

When successes lull us into complacency, or setbacks prompt us to despair, when frustration with others draws us into a self-righteous desire to judge or condemn:

lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

In the assurance of faith, in the confidence of hope, in the will to serve, help us to honour Christ as Lord, love one another as ourselves, and bring the good news of redemption to every living creature.

For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and for ever. Amen.

C3 Creation

Readings and prayers linked together and based on the Genesis Creation Story:

LIGHT:

The two main candles on the altar are lit

Genesis 1: 3-5 'God creates light'

Silence is kept.

As light dawns upon our world each morning, so may your light, O Christ, dawn in our hearts this day. Illumine our minds and dispel the dark shadows of selfishness, fear and hatred: for your dear Name's sake.

WATER:

A large jug of water is placed on the altar

Genesis 1: 6-8 'God creates water'.

Silence is kept.

O God, eternal fount of life, As streams and rivers flow through the mountains

and plains,

to refresh the land and quench our thirst,

may your Spirit flow through us.

May you wash away our sin,

revive our zeal.

renew the earth.

and become within us a spring welling up to eternal life.

We ask this in the name of your only Son,

our Saviour. Jesus Christ.

LAND:

A glass bowl of earth or plant in a pot is placed on the altar.

Genesis 1:9-13: 'God creates plants and trees',

Silence is kept.

Lord of the harvest. we praise you for the fruits of the earth which you give to us in their seasons. Help us so to use them, that we may hasten the time when the whole Creation will enter into the glorious liberty of the children of God,

SUN, MOON AND STARS:

Additional small candles are lit

through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Genesis 1: 14-19: 'God creates 'lights' in the sky',

Silence is kept.

Almighty God,

you have created the heavens and the earth and made us in your own image: teach us to discern your hand in all your works

and your likeness in all your children;

through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit

reigns supreme over all things

now and for ever.

LIVING CREATURES:

Pictures of animals for whom people are praying are brought forward and placed on the altar

Genesis 1: 20-31: 'God creates the fish and the birds. the animals and the humans'

Silence is kept.

Almighty God,

you have broken the tyranny of sin

and have sent the Spirit of your Son into our hearts

whereby we call you Father:

give us grace to dedicate our freedom to your service,

that we and all creation may be brought to the glorious liberty of the children of God;

through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord,

who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

THE LIGHT OF THE WORLD:

The Paschal or Easter candle is lit.

We light this candle

to remind us that when God the Father sent his Son, it was to reconcile the whole of Creation to himself, both things in heaven and things on earth.

Jesus Christ is the light of the world, a light no darkness can quench.

May the light of Christ banish all darkness from our hearts and from the world.

John 1: 1-14: 'The Light of the World'

Candles held by the congregation may be lit

C4 Liberation Readings on the theme of freedom:

Leader: Job is reminded by God of the many animals living free in

the wild.

Reader: "Then the Lord answered Job out of the storm. He said:

'... Do you know when the mountain goats give birth? Do you watch when the doe bears her fawn? ... Who let the wild donkey go free? Who untied his ropes? I gave him the wasteland as his home, the salt flats as his habitat... Will the wild ox consent to serve you? Will he stay by your manger at night? ... Does the hawk take flight by your wisdom and spread his wings towards the south? Does the eagle soar at your command and build his nests on high? ...' Then Job answered the Lord: 'I am unworthy – how can I reply to you? I put my hand over my mouth. I spoke once, but I have no answer – twice, but I will say no more."

Job 38:1; 39:1,5-6,9,26-27; 40: 3-5

Leader: The Israelites saw their animals as sharing in the

blessings of their God-given freedom:

Reader: "Observe the Sabbath day by keeping it holy ...On it

you shall not do any work, neither you, nor your son or daughter, nor your manservant or maidservant, nor your ox, your donkey or any of your animals ... Remember that you were slaves in Egypt and that the Lord your God brought you out of there with a mighty hand and an

outstretched arm."

Leader: A prophet described the return of the people from

captivity in Babylon as like a second Exodus, spelling both the restoration of the land and the freeing of

captives:

Reader: The desert and the parched land will be glad;

the wilderness will rejoice and blossom.
Like the crocus, 2 it will burst into bloom; it will rejoice greatly and shout for joy.
The glory of Lebanon will be given to it, the splendour of Carmel and Sharon; they will see the glory of the LORD,

the splendour of our God.

3 Strengthen the feeble hands, steady the knees that give way;

4 say to those with fearful hearts,

"Be strong, do not fear; your God will come,

he will come with vengeance;

with divine retribution he will come to save you."
